I receive your letter last night little
before dark Sep 27th 1862

Sept 28th 1862
My Dear Bella
I write these few lines to inform you that
i receive your kind and affectionate letter i was
glad to hear that you were all in good health
i am in very good health as usual over
camp is about half a mile from the Town
of Suffolk the rail Road runs through the
edge of the town and up through over
camp over Reig^t was called up at four o'clock
this morning in line for battle expecting an
attack of the rebels we expect to have a fight
hear before long this part of the Country is
very sickly the fever and ague is very bad
hear sum times the nights are very cold and on
that account there at much ague the country
around hear is very low and level there
is a big Swamp they call it the dismal
Swamp it is from eight to ten miles
wide and about thirty miles long
the Soldiers is hard at work every
day sum chopping and sum digging
ditch pits to collect from the

My Dear bell i expect for sure that
wee shall have a pay this next week coming
in there is great Scasety of money in the
Army at present it is a long time since
the men where payd all though i can get
along very well i have spent Twenty five
Cents of that dollar you send me and i
have got a quarters worth of tobacco in
my nap sack and that will dow me two
weeks but Still i would like to get my
pay so i can send them money to you
for you to by your winter Coal and your
winter flower and potatoes and all your
winter Stock of all your need clothing
for winter when ever wee will make
over winter quarter if wee will get one
a tall i will true then to get a few load
to come home and i will get one then
i belive i have no partickilars to
send to you fruits Apples and peaches
are very dear Apples a Cent a piece and
peaches about the same and very Scas
i bought five figs for five Cents last week
