Dear Brother

I once more take the pleasure of writing to you, without however receiving any reply to the 3 last Letters I sent you in the course of the last 2 years I have to trust and hope you will not neglect answering this as I have been, and am still, very anxious of hearing from you. I have to inform you that I have a Family of no less than 10 Children, viz, 8 Boys, & 2 Girls, the oldest of which is in his 20th year, and the youngest 10 months, and as I have the pleasure of saying

that I have the largest Family
in this Town, perhaps it would

me, and knowing well, that if I and
my large Family were once over

in America we could get on
much better than in this County.
but however I now feel a little
to the contrary, owing to the benefit
this little Town is likely to derive
from a Railway which is now in
the making from here to Newtown
which, as every one expects, will be
the means of flourishing this
place very much. I am still
following my old Trade & really
a poor old Trade it is. My
Wife is doing a little business in
selling Bread, Cakes, &c., but very
unfortunately, she labors under a
great disadvantage, being short of
a little money to be enabled to purchase
flour on the best hand. As we
have no relative or friend here
in circumstances to apply to for
the loan of a few pounds to help
