Friday Evening
We are all well as common only Willie has been quite unwell for a few days with a cold in the throat. we received a letter from you a few days ago. we were so happy to hear you had returned or promptly. But did not I have got through blowing a storm. I have got the Gardener's report. Also copied which we share in. I have heard mostly we had a fine time. Ed. I understand a Log. I saw up the children folk with him all day. we worked the flowers

I almost of the 3 or 4 lbs the
Barn lambs I heard about
much more than I thought
they would & the bucks about
the same I think the Sprague
Barn Lamb went anything I ever
heard of the Sheep 13 lbs
& weighed only 450 when
shearred with the straps in
I will send you the weight
of some of them & would send
a sample of the wool but I have
only one of a kind & have
got the sheep out to a shearer
of paper & don't like to look
back of them as you can see
them when you do come
home. Finally Abe & I went up
& sheared Gills yearling buck
his Sprague buck shearred 13 3/4 &
the Orville buck 10 1/2 Charles
best one shearred 12 1/2 & Jack
Crumbs yearling shearred 14 lbs
weights about 120

Wednesday Abe & I sheared up
a few of the old Buns in the
p.m. & I carried him up to
Rents yesterday & to do I have
been working in the garden
almost of the time. I think
of going to Wagoners to
look over if nothing happens
to mill. The shed is set and
planted the corn ground next
week the small lambs are
doing first rate now I
think I have 8 or 10 good ones
I shall wash the rest of my
sheep next week. Gil Miller
was here yesterday to see the Buns
he is going to Poughkeepsie by
a R.R. (next Monday) I have
not bought the sheep half of the
Lamb thought I would let well
Enough alone & not run in
for any more sheep until I sold
