My Dear Sir: Recd your telegram yesterday in answer
to my day letter - also your favor 19th
and also telegram of today -
I realize your anxiety that no false move be
made by my prejudging your interests and
Mr Edwards will advise you that every step
took with the Brooklyn Co. was taken advising

I told him we would cheerfully do this and
I submitted the spec in writing.

They have only 2 of the American Co. switches

dictated a letter stopping further deliveries
and said the 2 would come out.
So I believe I have this Co. in line.
