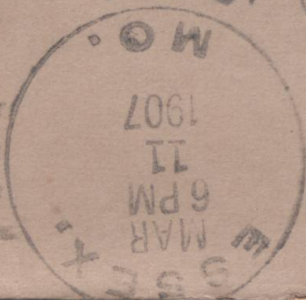

them for my album.

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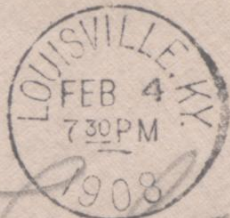
I got a Leap year card

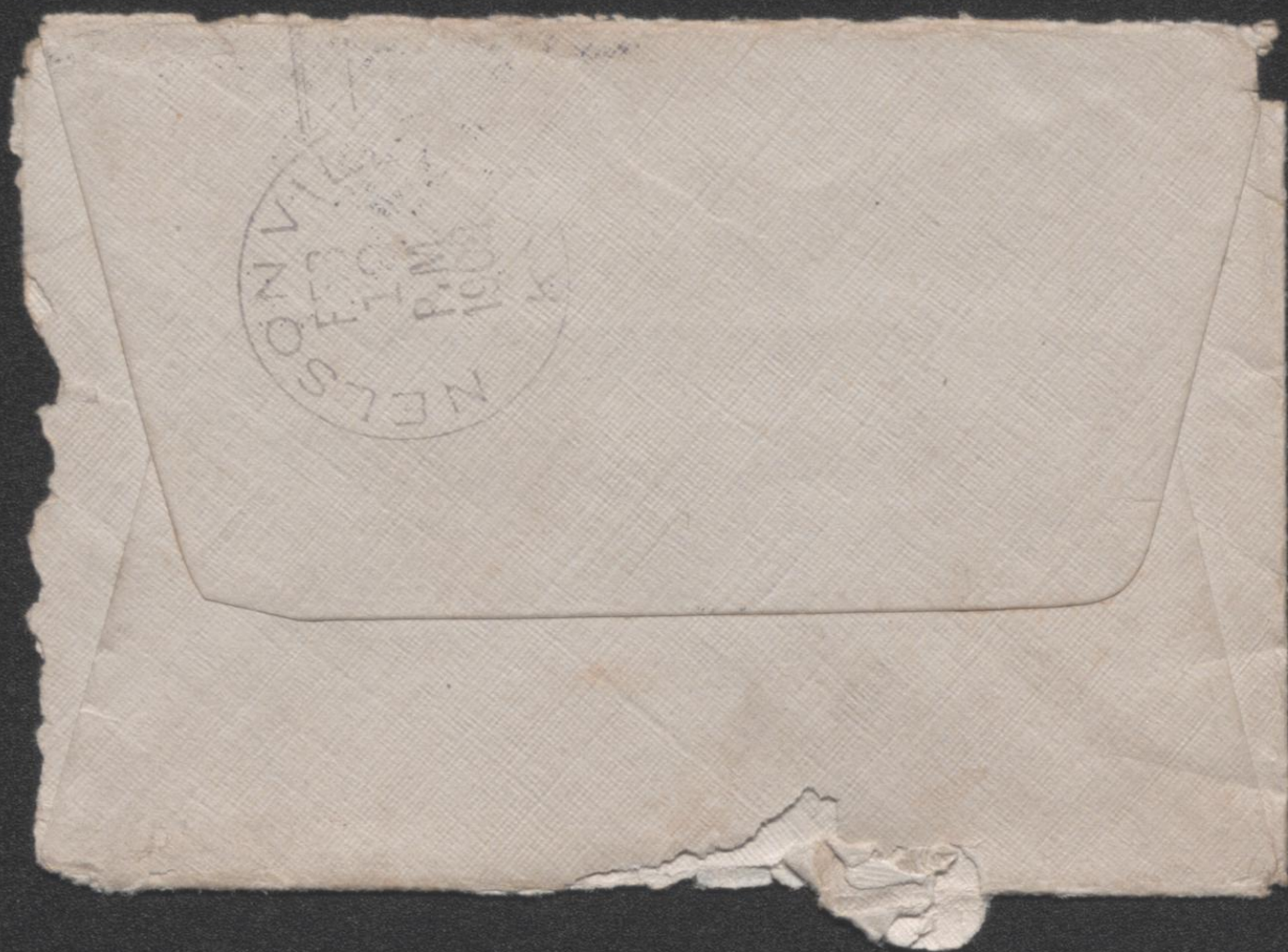

a letter from you

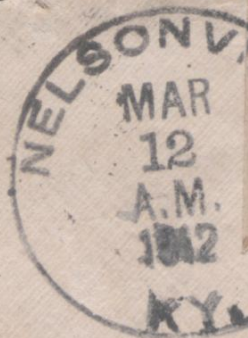
