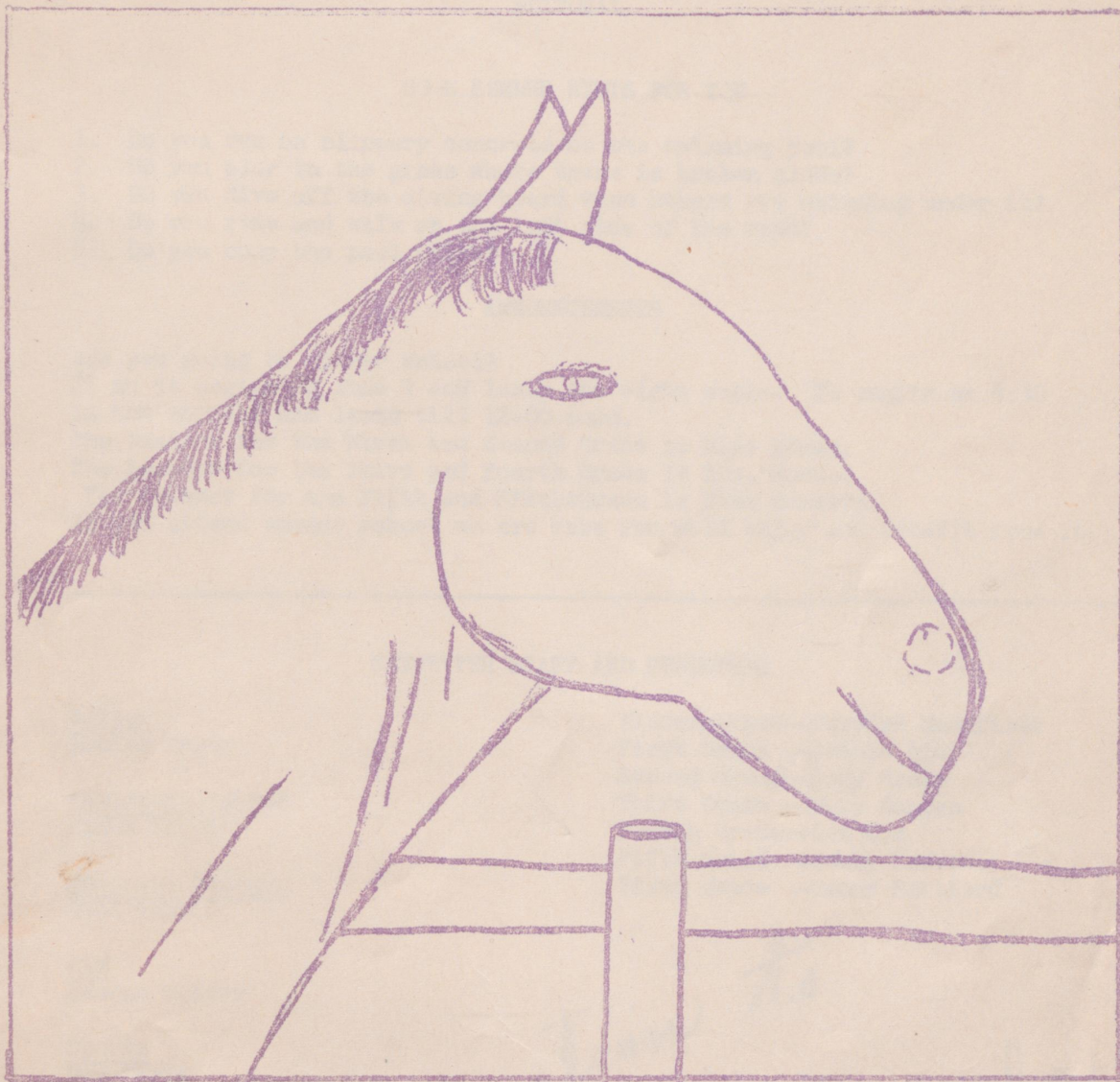

OUR WALK ON THE CAMPUS

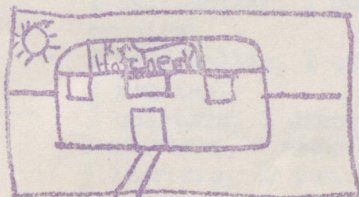
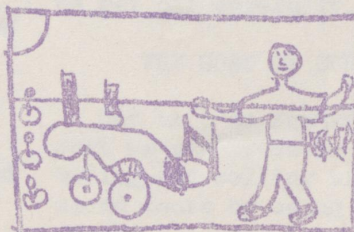
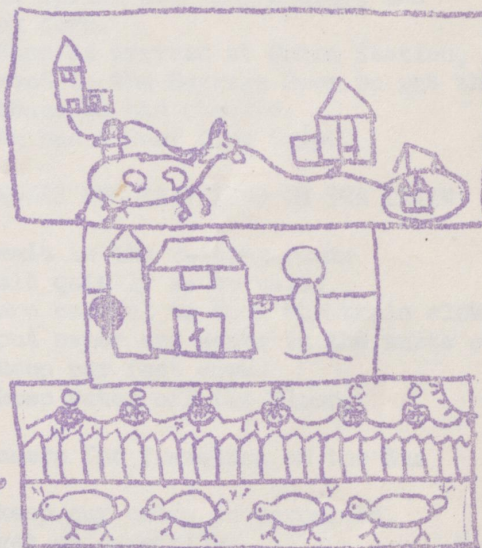
We went for a walk on the University campus. We saw many signs of Spring. We saw Robins, flowers, insects, and grass.

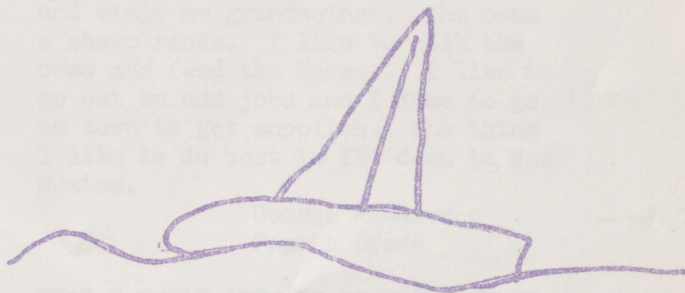

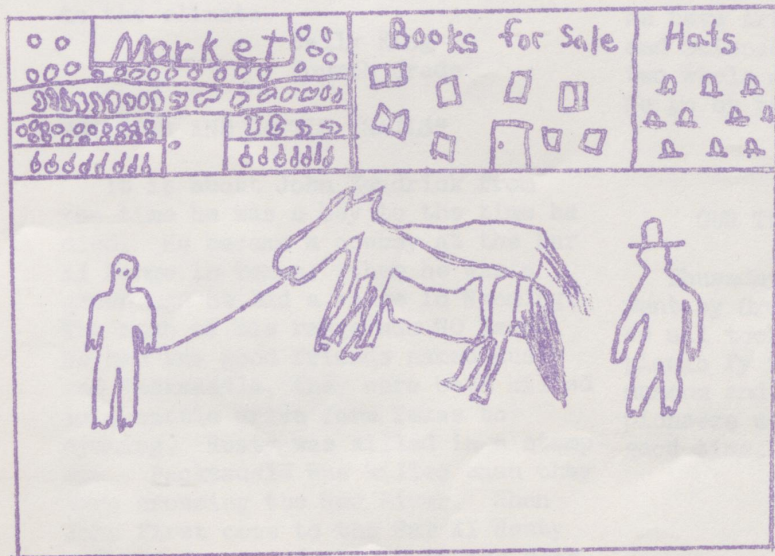

SPORTS

ORGANIZATION OF SCHOOL SPORTS

In the early days of college sports, the students formed themselves into sports clubs on the English pattern. Each club played a different sport and had dues for membership and a set of officers. Then they began to challenge other clubs and outside city teams. In this way intercollegiate sports slowly developed. Cricket gradually changed into baseball. The earliest football was much like its English ancestors, soccer and Rugby. The early track meets had many events familiar today. But they also had such odd events as the ten-mile walk, throwing a sixteen-pound sledge, glass ball shooting, collar and elbow-wrestling, wheelbarrow race, fat men's race, and chasing the greased pig. Gradually they novel events were speed, strength, skill, and endurance.

Baseball has been for many years the national game of the United States. It is now widely played in almost every country of the world.

American soldiers and sailors in World War II had much to do with spreading the game. It was one of their favorite recreations whenever they could find time to play. Natives of countries in Europe, Asia, Australia, and many Pacific Islands became interested in the game and learned how to play it from American servicemen. Even before World War II, baseball had enjoyed some international growth tours made by famous American College and professional teams had brought the game to Japan and other countries. Native players developed considerable skill at the sport.
